Ken Ho is an Instructor of Medicine in the Division of Infectious Diseases. He completed his internal medicine training in 2007 at UPMC and then completed a three year fellowship in Infectious Diseases at UPMC. During this period, he was selected as an NIH T32 fellow and conducted research on DNA damage biomarkers of human papillomavirus associated anal dysplasia.

Dr. Ho's current interests lie in HIV prevention with a focus on microbicides and oral pre-exposure prophylaxis. He is a site principal investigator for HPTN-069, a safety and tolerability study of Maraviroc as pre-exposure prophylaxis. He is also a pharmacovigilance safety officer with the NIH funded Microbicide Trials Network.
