Partner Services (Offered by all Health Departments)





What are Partner Services (PS)?

 Services that should be offered to persons infected with HIV or other sexually transmitted infections (STIs) and their sex or needle-sharing partners

Services include:

- Testing
- Linkage to care & Treatment
- Counseling and Education
- Resources and Referrals

Priority Cases:

- HIV
- Syphilis
- Gonorrhea in pregnancy





Benefits of Partner Services

- Persons infected with HIV and/or STIs
 - Assistance with confidentially notifying exposed partners
- Exposed partners
 - Getting informed of exposure to HIV/STD, along with referrals to testing, treatment and counseling
- Community
 - Earlier identification and treatment to undiagnosed cases of HIV/STDs
 - Decreased transmission





Background

- 1940s Contact Tracing
- 1986- HIV testing and partner notification services are offered in all STI clinics statewide
- 2006- Some community-based organizations that conduct HIV testing begin eliciting partner information from patients with HIV





Principles of Partner Services

Client-centered

Tailored services

Confidential

 The identity of the patient is never revealed to potentially exposed partners, and no information from the exposed partners is brought back to the original patient.

Voluntary and non-coercive

- For both the patient and potentially infected partners

Comprehensive and integrative

- Part of an array of services

Free, accessible and available to all

 Regardless of where people are tested or receive a diagnosis, and whether they were tested confidentially or anonymously

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Who Notifies Partners?



These health department employees do the door-to-door activities.





Who are Disease Intervention Specialists? Aka the people that show up at your house to find out who you had sex with!

DIS follow up with all cases of HIV, syphilis, and gonorrhea in pregnancy.

DIS provide:

- Education
- Treatment
- Risk reduction
- Linkage to care
- Resources and referrals





DIS and Medical Providers

- DIS will contact the provider's office where patient was originally tested to obtain background information
 - Contact info (address, phone number, e-mail, emergency contact)
 - Symptoms
 - Treatment provided
 - Testing history
 - Risk info (partners, drug use)





DIS and Patients

- DIS interview is voluntary, and most patients agree to it
- DIS will contact patient by whatever means available (phone calls, texts, e-mail, home visits, work visits) and try to set up a time to meet in person
- DIS offer flexibility when meeting (health department, home, doctor's office, Starbucks, etc.

Ideally, DIS meets with a patient within a few days of his/her diagnosis: TIMELINESS is a factor in reducing disease transmission.







Effectiveness of Partner Services

- Voluntary testing 1% positivity
- Elicited partners 12-20% positivity

Partner Services Works!

Steps in Partner Services

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Notifying &

TYPES OF DISCLOSURE ASSISTANCE

Anonymous Third Party Notification – a professional notifies your partners. You provide identifying and locating information only. Your name and identity are never shared with your partners. **Most people choose this method as it is the only method that provides anonymity.**

Dual Disclosure – you notify your partner in the presence of and with the assistance of a counselor. The counselor supports you during the process and can answer questions from your partner.

Self Disclosure – you notify your partners and bring them in or encourage them to come in for testing and treatment. A counselor will help you plan and practice what you are going to say. If your partners don't come in for services, however, you will then be asked to identify them so the health department can contact them. Some people prefer self disclosure **but it does not protect your identity** and you have to deal with the possible negative reactions from your partners.



Potential Obstacles

- Invasion of privacy
- Concerns about confidentiality
- Concerns about impact on relationships
- Partner violence
 concerns

- Distrust of public health system
- Requires a skilled
 counselor
- Patients have anonymous partners
- Patients forget!





In-Spot Partner Notification System <u>www.inspot.org</u>

- You can send electronic postcards anonymously or from your email address to tell partners they may have been exposed to HIV or an STI.
- No personally-identifiable information is collected or shared with any public or private agency
- Not meant to replace the use of traditional partner services referrals




In-Spot Partner Notification System


